

# CLOSE RACES SEEN IN SECOND INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIP MEET

40-and-8 Club 11 Points Behind Collegians as Result  
Of Shut-out in Junior Men's Relay—Miss How-  
land Wins 500 Women's Freestyle Event

THE NATATORS of the 40 and 8 club which makes its headquarters at the War Memorial natatorium kept pace of the University of Hawaii Rainbows and remained only one point behind the collegians until the final event of the second meet of the annual Hawaiian Indoor Swimming championships last night in the University pool, but because they failed to place in the 400-yard junior Hawaiian championship relay for men, which was won by the Rainbows, the Waikiki aggregation is this morning trailing its rivals by eleven points.

The collegians have 60 points while 40 and 8 has 49. Outrigger follows with 28. Other teams in the order of their scoring are: Palama 26, Roosevelt 25, Citywide 23, Nuuanu Y 10, Army 6, and Central Y 3. Unattached swimmers have registered 19 points.

It was announced last night that the remaining two meets will be held on succeeding Wednesday evenings with trials on Monday.

All the races last night were bitterly contested and the fans who turned out were amply rewarded for their efforts.

## MISS HOWLAND WINS

Rachael Howland of the University of Hawaii won the 500-yard freestyle Hawaiian championship event for women in a close race from Mildred Slight of the Outrigger club. Miss Howland set the pace all through the race. On the last lap Miss Slight put up a stiff challenge, but the University student rose to the occasion and won by a yard. Betty Stevenson of Outrigger was third. Miss Howland's time was 7 minutes 47 1/5 seconds.

In the blue ribbon event for men—the 220-yard freestyle for the Hawaiian championship—Wendel Bayne of Roosevelt swam a heady race and, with a powerful finish, emerged on top. His time was 2 minutes 30 4/5 seconds.

Doble of the Army got away to a flying start and for six laps led by a comfortable margin, but at this juncture, Bayne and Wilbur Craw of the University began closing up on him and then passed him as they swung around for the final lap to finish in one-two order. William Waidlich, veteran Army performer, made a strong finish to nose out Doble for third place.

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## Fireman Jim Flynn, Former Heavy, Passes

LOS ANGELES, April 12—Fireman Jim Flynn, the only man to knock out Jack Dempsey, died here today, poor and forgotten, following a heart attack.

Flynn accomplished his history making feat in Murray, Utah, in 1916. Twice he was a heavyweight contender, against Tommy Ryan in 1906 and Jack Johnson in 1912.

NEW YORK, April 12—Jack Dempsey tonight heard the news of Fireman Jim Flynn's death with regret and memories of the only knockout punch he ever took.

"I have been quoted as saying I dived for Flynn," Dempsey said, recalling the time the Fireman knocked him out in 1916, "but I didn't and I never said I did. It was a clean first round knockout. I was lugged away feet foremost.

"I squared it the next year though. I belted him and a dozen others out in first rounds and won the title the year after that.

"The Fireman was as tough as they came."
