

# Close Races

150-yard backstroke Hawaiian championship for men, finishing several yards ahead of Kapua Harris of the Central Y, who shot past Adolph Desha of the University for second honors in the final five yards of the race. The time was 1 minute 52 3/5 seconds. For most of the race Desha set the pace.

In a big surprise Miss Tomogawa of the 40-and-8 defeated Mildred Slight in the 100-yard breaststroke Hawaiian championship event for women. The time was 1 minute 33 3/5 seconds. Betty Stevenson finished third.

With Miss Howland establishing a ten-yard lead in the backstroke, and with Miss Duncan and Miss Mollie Webster holding their own in the breaststroke and freestyle, respectively, the University of Hawaii won the women's 300-yard medley relay open Hawaiian championship compet.

Outrigger was second and Roosevelt third.

## INCREASE LEAD

As the teams went to their posts for the 400-yard relay junior Hawaiian championship race for men, the finale of the evening, the University was leading 40 and 8 by 50 points to 49. However, the collegians increased their lead to eleven digits when they triumphed, while the 40 and 8 quartet was shutout, Palama finishing second and Citywide third.

Kuramoto, Fujii, Noda and DuBois composed the University team. Fujii swam a good second lap to send the Rainbows into the lead, which Noda and DuBois maintained during the remainder of the race. The time was 4 minutes 6 3/5 seconds.

F. Tanaka of 40 and 8 won the 100-yard backstroke for boys under 16 in 1 minute 13 2/5 seconds; Milliken, unattached, showed his heels to the field in the 220-yard breaststroke junior for men, his time being 3 minutes 12 3/5 seconds; N. Aluli of the University captured top honors in the 100-yard backstroke novice for men in 1 minute 13 3/5 seconds; Yokomoto led his rivals to the finishing line in the 50-yard backstroke for boys under 13 years of age in 40 4/5 seconds; while Margaret Morse of 40 and 8 came through with flying colors in the 100-yard backstroke novice for women in the time of 1 minute 23 seconds; and G. Holden of Outrigger emerged on top in the 50-yard backstroke for girls under 13 in a close race in the time of 45 3/5 seconds.
