

# DEANS AHEAD BY 11 POINTS IN TWO MEETS

Rainbow Mermaid Turns In  
Victory In 500; Wendel  
Bayne Cops Men's 220

Hairline finishes and highly exciting races, all of which were freely predicted, marked the second meet of the Hawaiian AAU indoor swimming championships at the University of Hawaii tank last night.

The Deans, by virtue of victories in both the 300 yard medley relay, women's open, and the 400 yard relay, men junior, collected an 11 point lead over their nearest rivals, the 40 & 8 club natators.

Up to the final event of the evening, the 400 yard relay, the 40 & 8 club had gallantly hung on but a point behind the Deans, the score actually being 50-49.

However, failure to place in the relay coupled with the fact that the Deans managed to win it created the 11 point breach that now exists as the teams go into the third meet next Wednesday.

### Bayne Surprises

Probably the biggest upset of the evening, in so far as the local experts were concerned, was in the 220 yard freestyle men open swim. The field consisted of such well known performers as William (Bill) Waidlich, Army; W. Craw, University of Hawaii, and E. Nakamura, 40 & 8. Also among the qualifiers were E. Doble, Army, and Wendell Bayne, Roosevelt.

For six laps Doble led the pack only to be passed by young Bayne and W. Craw at the middle of the seventh lap. Waidlich, although fourth, was pressing all the time. Bayne and Craw swam neck and neck up to the eighth lap, turned, and then headed for the remaining 20 yards.

By a scant margin Bayne, the underdog, swam under the line ahead of Craw to annex the race. Third place was also very close, Waidlich barely nosing out Doble. The time was 2 minutes 30 4-5, a creditable showing.

Perhaps the best race among the women and the most thrilling of the evening was the 500 yards freestyle women's open event. Rachel Howland, University mermaid; Midred Slaght and Betty Stevenson, both of the OCC composed the trio in the race. For 19 entire laps, Howland and Slaght swam neck and neck, neither of them giving ground to the other.

### Wins By a Yard

Entering the final spurt, both competitors unleashed all the reserve power in them. Down the
