Without doubt the most interesting race of the evening was the 300 yard medley individual men's open. Right from the start it developed into a three way fight between El-win Doble, William Waidlich, both of the Army, and Adolph Desha of the university.

At the outset of the breaststroke, Waidlich commanded a lead of about a yard or two. Desha came to the fore with powerful two-arm pulls in the backstroke stage of the grind, although all three swimmers were never separated from one another by any great extent.

Doble and Waidlich were neck and neck in the backstroke. Desha maintained his lead in the free-style part of the race until the very last 25 yards. Here Doble passed him with powerful finishing strokes and Waidlich put on a similar spurt for the finish. Doble won the race by two yards, Waidlich nosing out Desha for second place by about a (Continued on Page 17)
