## Searchlights To Flood Bay During Event Planned For Fleet By Canoe Club

Plans for entering crews in canoe races at Hawaii, volleyball teams in the coming AAU city championships and swimmers in coming events are but a part of the activities proposed by the Outrigger Canoe club.

Outstanding amongst coming events will be a moonlight spectacle of surfboard riding and canoeing in the surf at Waikiki. The committee on arrangements headed by George Perry has arranged to have the waters and beach flooded by searchlights from adjacent forts so that the exhibitions by the best swimmers, surfboard riders and canoe experts may be witnessed from beach hotels and Waikiki beach.

It is planned to hold this spectacle during the forthcoming visit of the fleet, as a gesture of welcome to the visiting navy personnel. This moonlight surfing spectacle will be preceded by a beach supper held on the lanai of the club grounds to which members and their guests will be welcome.
