Important Conference Held at Nuuanu Y—Dad Cen- ter to Be Chairman of Committee To Handle Coaches

A DETERMINED effort to bring back swimming was made yesterday in the Nuuanu Y when coaches and others interested in the sport met with the Swimming Committee of the Hawaiian A. A. U. Clubs represented were Central Y, Citywide, U. of Hawaii, Palama, Nuuanu Y, 40 & 8, Roosevelt, Punahou, Outrigger, Army & Navy Y and the Army.

The representatives decided to put on a major meet, open to all A. A. U. swimmers, at least once a month. Clubs were enthusiastic about bringing competitive swims before the public eye and not particularly interest in prizes.
