

LOCAL PADDLERS TO SHOW IN 6 RACES IN HONOLULU HARBOR

Senior Events to Be Over 2½ Miles, Juniors 1½ Miles, and Boys and Girls, One Mile—Compet To Be Staged to Raise Funds for Kona Trip

A GENUINE Hawaiian outrigger canoe paddling regatta will be held August 4 in the Honolulu Harbor, it was announced yesterday. Six events will be staged and they will provide no end of thrills for the large crowd that is expected to see the spectacle, as the canoes go speeding down the home stretch in each race.

This regatta will more or less be a preview to the annual Kona paddling races which are slated for August 24, with the Big Island oarsmen matching skill and power against the Oahu experts from the beach at Waikiki. The scene of the Kona regatta will be Kailua.

According to yesterday's announcement, arrangements will be made at Pier 2 to take care of the fans. There will be a limited number of first row automobile parking privileges. Each spectator will be charged a nominal fee of 25 cents. The money raised will be used to cover the cost of sending the local crews to the paddling championships in Kailua.

HOLD SIX RACES

The regatta committee which is composed of three representatives each from Hui Nalu, Outrigger Canoe Club, and Queen's Surfriders with Clarence Byer as chairman, has decided to stage six races. There will be two types of crews for the seniors and juniors—one being six paddles and another four. There will also be "sixes" for boys and girls.

The senior races will be over 2½ miles and the junior competes over 1½ miles. The events for boys and girls under 15 will be held over a mile course.

These races will be of great importance to the coaches of the different crews, for they will afford the mentors an opportunity to size up their men and crews under fire, and to make the necessary corrections and changes in crews before the championships at Kailua.

The local regatta committee is composed of Clarence Byer, chairman; Lei Whittie, Howard Vierra, A. K. Pang of Hui Nalu; Clarence Byer, Cecil Benny, George Perry of Outrigger Canoe Club; and Charles Amalu, Jimmy Whittie, and Carlos Long, Jr., of the Queen's Surf Riders.

The crews have already started training and are fast whipping into top condition.

KONA IS PREPARING

Reports from Kona have it that the crews representing that district will be stronger than ever. New boats are being built and powerful crews developed for the annual championship races.

The territorial canoe paddling races were revived several years ago. In ancient times, crews from all the islands of the Hawaiian group vied for honors, and, according to history, the races were invariably close and the day of the compet was featured by colorful pageantry.

The first modern regatta was held in Kealahou Bay in 1933. Last year it was held in the same historic bay. Each compet attracted huge crowds from all over the territory. This year is expected to be no different. Accommodations will be available for thousands of fans.

It was officially learned yesterday that in 1936 the Kona crews will leave their waters for the first time and compete in Honolulu. The 1936 championships have been awarded to this city.

Local officials will start making preparations for a huge regatta to be held locally next summer shortly after the Kailua races are held.
