FOUR OTHER EVENTS

Following the senior six will come the almost as important junior six followed by the senior two and the senior four, final event of the day.

The entire program will be run off without interruptions between races, and it is expected that the final finish will be witnessed by 11:30 a. m.

Duke P. Kahanamoku, whose prowess as a paddler is well known in all parts of the Islands, will forego his seat in the Hui Nalu boat this year in favor of the important position of clerk of the course. Duke will see to it that the races are run off with dispatch and assures the big crowd that is expected at the waterfront that there will be no waits and no long drawn out regatta.

OTHER OFFICIALS

Knute Cottrell will handle the gun as starter of the races, while Harbormaster James Friel will act as marshal of the course. Announcers will be Moe Lippman and Walter Francois "Buster" McGuire, both of whom possess booming voices.

Mystery Airplane Lost During Test

LOS ANGELES, July 30.—Four police air detail planes searched the Palos Verdes hills tonight but reported they failed to find a trace of a new Northrop mystery army pursuit plane which was designated as lost following a take-off for a test flight.

Lieut. Arthur H. Skaer, regular test pilot for Northrop ships, was piloting the missing plane.

The Northrop was reputed to be the fastest military plane in the world. Built by secret design, she had been rigidly guarded and even the takeoff on the test flight was cloaked in secrecy.

Police planes, augmented by National Guard planes from Long Beach and army planes from March Field, at Riverside, will resume the search at dawn.
