35th Infantry Officer Given Organized Reserves Duty At Oakland, Cal.

Lt. Col. Ernest L. Pell, 35th Infantry, has been ordered to duty with the organized reserves, the station at Oakland, Cal.

Arriving in the Hawaiian department on October 20, 1931, Col. Pell was assigned to duty at Schofield with the 35th Infantry and at present he is its executive officer.

Born in Colorado, Col. Pell was commissioned a second lieutenant of infantry January 2, 1908. He was promoted to the grade of first lieutenant on February 20, 1914, and to the grade of captain on February 1, 1917. During the World war he held the temporary rank of major and was permanently promoted to that grade July 1, 1920. He was promoted to the grade of lieutenant colonel August 1, 1931.

Col. Pell is a graduate of the army school of the line, 1922, and the infantry school field officers' course, 1921.

During their stay in the islands, both he and Mrs. Pell have made many friends who will regret their departure.

# HEAD OF CANOE CLUB TO LEAVE HERE APRIL 26

Timberlakes Going On World Cruise Before He Reports At Ft. Leavenworth

The personnel of the 64th Coast Artillery, anti-aircraft regiment at Ft. Shafter, will lose one of its finest officers this month with the departure of Capt. Edward W. Timberlake for new assignment to the general staff school at Ft. Leavenworth, Kans.

Prior to returning to the mainland, Capt. Timberlake, accompanied by Mrs. Timberlake, will make an extensive around the world cruise, sailing from Honolulu for the Orient aboard the Empress of Japan on April 26.

As battery commander of Battery G, crack gun battery of the Kalihl regiment, Capt. Timberlake has commanded one of the finest organizations in this department. It was under his inspiring leadership that his battery won the Col. R. H. Williams athletic supremacy trophy last year for outstanding excellence in sports at Ft. Shafter, and it was under his capable direction that the anti-aircraft gunners of Battery G established a splendid record during their recent target practice at Waimanalo on windward Oahu.

Has Many Civilian Friends

Not only among the military circles will Capt. Timberlake's departure be felt, but also among the civilian population of Honolulu where his many activities in the past have left their definite mark. He has been a member of the Oahu Country club, the Wai'alae Golf club and the Ft. Shafter Golf club. He also has the distinction of being the president of the Outrigger Canoe club.

As a young man, living here in Honolulu from 1908 to 1913 (his father, Col. E. J. Timberlake, commanding the harbor defenses of Oahu at that time), Capt. Timberlake and a group of other local youths saw the need of a club along Waikiki beach, and getting together they formed the nucleus of what today is the Outrigger Canoe club.

Attending Punahou school here in his youth, Capt. Timberlake won his laurels on the local school's football, baseball and track teams, and in 1913 won his appointment (presidential at large) to the U. S. military academy.

While at West Point, with the fine sports background he had attained while at Punahou, Capt. Timberlake soon won his berth as tackle on the military academy's varsity football squad and also covered first base on its baseball team. In 1914 he won national prominence in the sports world when he was named by Walter Camp and other outstanding authorities as tackle on the All-American football team.

It is interesting to note that it was Capt. Timberlake's father who had the distinction of being the first army man to score against Annapolis in the first army vs. navy intersectional game ever played, back in 1892. Since then three of Capt. Timberlake's brothers, two of whom are now officers in the air corps, also distinguished themselves as athletes at West Point. It will be recalled that one of these brothers, "Ted" Timberlake, served at Luke field recently and as coach and member of the air corps swimming team, aided in winning for Luke field the service swimming championship for the first time in many years.

Had Overseas Service

Graduating from West Point in 1917, Capt. Timberlake was commissioned in the infantry and during the World war served overseas with the 26th Infantry, 1st Division. After the armistice, he transferred to the C. A. and remained with the AEF at Coblenz, Germany, until 1922.

Since then, Capt. Timberlake has served with the 62nd Anti-aircraft regiment at Ft. Totten, L. I., N. Y., and also at Ft. Hancock, Va. In 1927 he returned to the military academy, where he served for several years as tactical officer.

July and August of 1931 saw Capt. Timberlake detached to Aldershot, England, and to Fontair Blance, France, to witness maneuvers of the mechanized forces and cavalry units of the English and French armies. While in England that year Capt. Timberlake was distinguished with an appointment as honorary captain of the "Queen's Own" Cameran Highlanders.

He arrived in the Hawaiian department on August 4, 1932, to be assigned to Battery G of the 64th C. A. (AA) at Ft. Shafter, where he has served ever since.
