

KAMEHAMEHA DAY TO BE A FESTIVE EVENT

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veloped on Honolulu's waterfront between Piers 3 and 4. The vacant lot has been cleared, canoe sheds covered with coconut branches have been erected. The tents which served as dressing rooms at first have been replaced by voting booths. Glistening koa canoes rest beneath the sheds. The harbor is dotted with outrigger canoes driven forward by stalwart paddlers. The friends and families of the outside island paddlers have accompanied them. Every afternoon the village is thronged with Hawaiians wearing lauhala hats. They lounge beneath the sheds and converse in the Hawaiian tongue. The paddlers present a picture of tanned, well muscled bodies.

Floats To Parade

Civic organizations are pushing preparations to decorate trucks as floats for the parade. Not until Wednesday evening will most of the organizations obtain trucks to decorate. Eben Low, executive secretary of the jubilee commission, is gathering more than 100 horses for the riders in the parade.

The parade, starting at 9:30 Thursday morning from Thomas Square, will be the first event in the day's program. The route is along Beretania St. to Bishop, down Bishop to King and along King to the capitol grounds.

Princesses To Ride

Three princesses will ride horses for each island, accompanied by outriders, pages and attendants. The women will wear the long, sweeping skirts of the pa-u riders. Lavish floats will represent each island. In addition local civic organizations will present floats. Grand marshal will be John C. Lane. Fourteen bands will march. A detachment will march from Ft. Kamehameha, named after the warrior king. Other units will be from the navy, schools and Hawaiian organizations. The Daughters and Sons of Hawaii will hold ceremonies before the statue of Kamehameha on the lawn of the judiciary building.

Following the parade there will be speeches in English and Hawaiian on the life of the two Hawaiian kings.

The inter-island canoe regatta in the harbor will commence at 2:30 in the afternoon. All seven races will start and finish in front of the bleachers on Pier 2. More than 300 athletes will perform for 10 clubs. Honolulu will be represented by the Outrigger Canoe club, Hui Nalu, Queen's Surf Riders, University of Hawaii, Healani Yacht club and Honolulu Girls. The Big Island's clubs, Milolii, Kailua and Honau-nau, are favored to cop the major events. Kauai is entering for the first time.

Water Pageant

The water pageant on the Ala Wai will commence at 8 in the evening under artificial lighting. Eight barges will represent the various islands. Troupes of singers and dancers will be on board to sing the island songs. The ninth barge will carry the queen of the carnival,

Cary Describes Core Study Plan

Miles E. Cary, McKinley high school principal, outlined before members of the Lions club at their noon meeting at the Alexander Young hotel today the "core" study course which will be offered to McKinley students starting in September, supplanting the traditional English and social science courses.

The new course, he said, will stress vocational and citizenship problems, improvement of written and oral English, best use of leisure time, how to live a better life and how to meet problems of health and home membership. Literature and history will be offered particularly as a background to present day problems and an aid to their solution.

He said the faculty intends to make the course as practical as possible in order to prepare students as much as possible for life in the present rather than the future, and to meet criticisms leveled against schools in the past.
