

# June Regatta to Be Largest In History; Committee Reports Scheduled Today

Further plans for the paddling regatta on June 11, which will bring to Honolulu harbor the greatest collection of Hawaiian canoes ever assembled in modern history, will be made at a meeting of the regatta committee at noon today in the Outrigger Canoe club.

Reports will be made by chairmen of the various sub-committees, which include: housing of paddlers from other islands, Theodore Searle; steamer transportation, Lorrin P. Thurston; entertainment, C. K. Amalu and Elmer Lee; race committee, James Whittle; finances, C. M. Dyer and C. G. Benny, and prizes, George II Brown.

Charles K. Amalu, appointed as chairman of the regatta committee by the jubilee commission in charge of the Kamehameha Day celebration, will preside at the meeting.

Preliminary plans have already assured committee members that the 1936 regatta will be the great-

est one in island paddling history.

At least 300 paddlers from all the islands will take part, 104 of

them to come over from Kona and others from Kauai. The Kona crews will carry the colors of Kailua, Honaunau, Milolii and Kona Japanese in the canoe races.

Oahu will send husky representatives from at least six island clubs, including the Outrigger Canoe club, Hui Nalu, University of Hawaii, the fire department, Queen Surf club and the Kunalu girls club.

And in the race will go a fleet of new canoes, constructed especially for the regatta. Julian Yates will bring at least one new canoe from Honaunau, the Outrigger has two new craft, and the University and fire department each has a new canoe.

The races will begin at 2 p. m. and accommodations for spectators will be furnished along the pier. The race committee has decided on a course to begin at the mauka end of the pier and heading out the channel. The turn will be made three-quarters of a
