

Records Broken in Swimming Events

The Hawaiian AAU indoor swimming championship meet, sponsored by the Honolulu Junior Chamber of Commerce, got under way at the Elizabeth Waterhouse Memorial tank Friday night.

Two senior records were broken last night, with Kiyoshi Nakama, Maui's topnotch middle distance star, establishing a new standard in the 500 yard freestyle race for men while the Citywide AA's crack wahine medley relay trio finished first in the 300 yard relay affair with another record shattering time.

The 500 yard senior crawl race early developed into a duel between teammates, Takeshi Hirose and Kiyoshi Nakama of Maui, with the outcome in doubt up to the finishing mark.

Nakama topped Hirose by a matter of inches to come in with a new island mark of 5 minute 46.3 seconds.

In Tuesday night's trial heat, Nakama negotiated the 500 yards in 5 minutes 48.7 seconds. The Maui boy held the previous Hawaiian standard of 6 minutes 5 seconds which he made last year.

Citywide's trio of Midge Garnsey (backstroke), Jean Kangeter (breaststroke) and Olga Clarke (freestyle) slaughtered the old Hawaiian record for the 300 yard medley by a big margin to finish the distance in 3 minutes 53.1 seconds which bettered the previous standard of 4 minutes 8.6 seconds made by the Outrigger club team in 1934.

Wins in Century

Takeshi Hirose of Maui startled last night's gathering with his upset win in the 100 yard open men's crawl race. Hirose topped the competing field composed of favorite Alex. Young, Barney Pung, James Armitage and Donald Hughes.

Young of Nuuanu Y finished fourth. Pung of Hui Makani was second with Armitage of the University reporting in at third. Time turned in for the century was mediocre. Hirose's winning mark was 55.1 seconds.

Lulu Kea of Palama again stroked her way to first in the century women's breaststroke event. Miss Kea's winning time was 1 minute 28.1 seconds which is slightly over a second slower than her present Hawaiian record made in the last Duke Kahanamoku meet.

Shizu Tamagawa of Hui Makani came in a close second while Fujiko Katsutani of Maui splashed her way to top Laurel Ensminger of Roosevelt high school for third place.

Miss Ensminger, however, is credited with the best time for the breaststroke event for the current meet with her 1 minute 27.9 seconds mark made in Tuesday night's trials.

Shinkawa Winner

K. Shinkawa of Nuuanu Y continued to dominate the men's breaststroke field with his sparkling 2 minute 54.8 second time win in the furlong breaststroke affair. A. Desha was a good second.

Team point standing of the different squads in the senior titular events showed the Citywide AA natators leading the field with 28 points with Hui Makani a close second with 26 points. Maui was tied with University for third position with 17 points while Nuuanu Y followed with nine points. Palama accounted for seven digits with Roosevelt high school trailing with one point.

Stubby Kruger, assisted by Duke Kahanamoku, entertained the crowd with a diving and swimming act.

Art Powlison acted as starter for the meet.
