Cromwell Canoe Is Winner In Second Outrigger Race

Sam Kahanamoku's crew, including Doris Duke Cromwell, sailed home the winners in the second race for the Pualani Topping Trophy for outrigger sailing canoes yesterday morning. Their canoe went over the course, which was slightly longer than last week, in the fast time of 57 minutes. Duke Kahanamoku, piloting Jack Briscoe's entry, finished second, and was followed by Buddy Adolphson in Dad Center's canoe and David Kahanamoku with Jayne "Leilani" Topping as crew in third

and fourth places.

The race to the first buoy was the most exciting part as several canoes jockeyed back and forth for the turn. Duke took an early lead closely followed by his brother Sam. The new entry skippered by Bob Topping was fighting it out with John Dee. Charlie Amalu and David Kahanamoku for third place at the buoy. The Ka Moi turned this point in third place, but carne about too soon and drifted past the buoy making another run mandatory. This cost precious time and the Ka Moi finally made the turn properly, followed only by John Makua, who had had the heartbreaking experience of seeing all his pulleys give way a short time before.

Duke Still Leads

At the second buoy. Duke was first with Sam, John Dee, Amalu and David close behind. At the third buoy Sam was leading, with Duke and Adolphson and David pressing hard. The Ka Moi had fallen far behind and rounded this point ahead of John Dee only. On the short run for

home before the wind the standing remained unchanged and the canoes finished in the same order.

Several changes had been made since last week, and Bob Topping, Charlie Amalu, and Jack Briscoe all turned out with different canoes and some changes in their crews. Topping had added George Perry and Sally Hale to his crew and had changed to the Ka Moi. Briscoe had put on Duke as steersman, and had taken the Outrigger Club's "Captain." Amalu had given up h's prized "Patches" and substituted a smaller canoe. Of all these Briscoe had the best luck and Amalu did much better than last week but hard luck still camped on the Topping entry. However Bob is sure that his new set-up is a winner and next week will see him and his crew out there trying as hard as ever. His motto is that the race is never won until the final gun has sounded.
