

Third Race In Outrigger Series Set For Tomorrow

The third outrigger sailing race for the Pualani Topping trophy will be started tomorrow at Waikiki beach at 10 a. m.

The course has been altered slightly to make the competitors try a little harder, and to make the race last longer for the spectators. The new course will be from shore, around the Diamond Head buoy, down to Popular Surf, then to Cunha's surf and back to the beach to finish. The only difference is that the first buoy will be the Diamond Head buoy instead of one anchored off Castle's Surf. This last buoy has given the most trouble and will not stay anchored. It seems to have plans to make a course of its own, and the last one was seen to be making good time toward Molokai the day after the sailing race.

All canoe skippers and judges are asked to meet with Sally Hale at the Waikiki Beach Patrol Headquarters on Saturday at 2:30 p. m. At this time lanes will be drawn for the sailing race and any sug-

gestions or questions regarding the rules will be heard.

David Kahanamoku has changed his canoe to the Wall "Hanakeeki," and had added Jack Hjorth, of Mainland sailing fame, to his crew. These changes are expected to put him ahead of the fourth place he has won twice. All the rest of the canoes and crews remain the same, with the possible addition of Dad Center in his own canoe, the "Lehua," skippered by Buddy Adolphson. This canoe has given a good account of itself, and barring accident or tough breaks should place among the winners again.

Topping Confident

Bob Topping still has his same crew and canoe, and after carefully planning a course of attack feels that he will be in the running this time. Hard luck and bad breaks have consistently dogged his trail but the Jinx has been anchored to the bottom, and barring a major catastrophe, his great canoe, the "Ka Moi" should be among the winners.
