VOLCANO REPORT

Week Ended March 19, 1939.

A marked but short lived increase of seismic activity was the outstanding development at the Hawaiian volcanoes for the week. The high rate of crack opening around Halemaumau rim which began last week continued during the seven day period of this report.

No slides were reported observed in Halemaumau. Fuming of the Southeast solfatara continues unchanged.

No changes have been reported observed on Mauna Loa.

Of 28 localities on concentric rim cracks around Halemaumau measured Friday morning March 17, 13 opened, none closed for a total opening of 13.5 millimeters. Along the Chain of Craters there were no appreciable changes in road cracks.

Of the 32 local seismic disturbances which registered on the Observatory seismographs, one was slight, 2 were feeble, 2 were very feeble earthquakes and 24 were tremors. The feeble earthquake, of Kilauea origin, registered at 9:54 a. m., March 14. It was 3.2 miles distance and was slightly felt at the Observatory. The two feeble earthquakes occurred March 14 at 10:55 a. m. and 12:10 respectively; distances were 5.5 and 3.7 miles. Very feeble earthquakes were:

March 13, 9:27 p. m., distance 5.9 miles.

March 14, 6:08 a. m., distances 4.0 miles.

March 14, 12:06 p. m., distance 5.2 miles.

March 15, 7:00 a. m., distance 63.0 miles.

March 19, 9:42 p. m., distance 32.5 miles.

Local seismic index was 12:50. Tilting of the ground at the Observatory Northeast rim of Kilauea Crater was moderate Southwest by West. Microseismic motion of the ground was strong.
