

# Open Canoe Race Is Slated Sunday

Craft Eligible To  
Enter Race

Consolation Race For  
James Shingle Cup on  
Tap Saturday

Following a canvass of the canoe skippers, it was decided yesterday to sail both the consolation race for the James Shingle cup and the Open race for the Hawaiian Town Gold Trophy over the weekend. The consolation race will take place off Waikiki Beach at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, and the open race will be sailed on Sunday at 10:00 a.m.

All skippers and judges are again asked to meet at the Waikiki Beach Patrol Headquarters on Saturday. However, the time for the meeting has been put ahead to 2:00 p.m. instead of 2:30 p.m. to allow the canoes to start off promptly at 2:30 p.m. Lanes will be drawn for both races at this time. Consequently, all skippers in both races are asked to be there or be represented by a member of their crew. Also the turning buoys on the two races will be announced and all questions regarding rules etc., will be discussed and answered by the race committee.

#### Six Canoe Entered

The six canoes competing in Saturday's race will be Pualani Topping and Bob Topping in the Ka Moi; Charles Amalu in the Apollo; Harry Steiner in the Steiner Bros. Special; John Ernstberg in his new canoe the Ilima; John D. Kaupiko, Sr., in the Black Maria; David Kahana-moku with Jayne Topping as part of the crew in the Halekulani.

The Sunday race is creating a lot of comment. It is open to all Hawaiian or Polynesian canoes of dug-out type. There will be no limitation of sails or sail area, and all members may carry paddles and use them as they wish. There will be no rule regarding which side of a given marker the turn shall be made, nor restriction regarding the number of persons in a crew. Some of the canoes will be manned by only one man, and others will carry as many as seven. All of the competitors for the Pualani Topping trophy will be entered and some of the new entrants are Elmer Lee in his Samoan canoe, and George Perry in his "Two-Speed" Special. Lono Heen is also contemplating entering his Tahitian canoe in this race. Pualani Topping has donated the use of her Wikiwiki as a committee boat for the races, and according to present indications this race will be one of the most hard fought of the entire season. Sunday's events will terminate canoe sailing until sometime in the early summer, so this will be the last chance for the public to enjoy this unique sport for some time. Both races will start and finish in front of the Outrigger Canoe Club off Waikiki Beach.
