

Beach Patrol Revision Urged

cer of the Outrigger Canoe club, proposed his plan to bring more organization to beach patrol and surfing activities at the beach.

Under his plan members of the private surfing clubs which now handle tourist surfing and canoe demands would receive half of their regular salaries from the Territory, for which they would do half-time duty as life guards doing regular beach patrol duty during these hours.

Time Their Own

The rest of their time would be devoted to regular surfing activities with the beach boys collecting usual fees from the surf riders.

A director for the entire force of life-guards and part-time life guards would be provided, with half his salary to come from the Territory.

In this way, Mr. Thurston declared, the Territory would have the advantage of more trained life-guards on call at all times, as well as building up morale in the life saving units.

Cost Little More

He said the plan would call for only a slightly increased expenditure than the present patrol organization at Waikiki.

At the same meeting the commission requested Mr. Thurston to ask officers of the Waikiki Beach Patrol if, pending a final decision on organization, they would consent to adopt a name which would not be confused with that of the Territorial Beach Patrol. Mr. Thurston assured the board he would forward their request to the Waikiki Beach Patrol.

During the discussion cleanliness of the beach area was brought up, with Mr. Thurston suggesting that an augmented beach force would considerably improve this condition by assigning each beach guard a special area to police.
