Is Triumphant

**Wins Three-Quarter Mile
Life Boat Race By
2½ Lengths**

2,000 SEE REGATTA

**Jack May Cops Surfboard
Race; Nalus Win Ca-
noe Paddling**

Australia's sturdy crew triumphed over the Territorial Beach Patrol oarsmen, representing the islands, in a three-quarter mile lifeboat race which was one of the feature events of the Pacific Aquatic Carnival regatta held Sunday morning on the Moana channel.

The oarsmen from the Antipodes won in the time of 6 minutes 57.7 seconds.

Rowing a fine race, the Australians won rather easily and there was at least two and a half boat lengths of open water at the finish between the Aussie and the Beach Patrol boats.

The Australian crew was made up of Davis, sweep; Harkness, stroke; Dickson 3, Mackney 2, and Braund bow.

Big Crowd See Races

A crowd of a couple of thousand witnessed the regatta, which consisted of lifeboat racing, canoe paddling, barge rowing, outboard racing, surfboard paddling, and swimming.

Australia also won the surfboard relay over one mile in 10 minutes 49.5 seconds as the result of a fine last lap turned in by Blue Russell, who paddled from a kneeling position instead of lying flat on the board. Outrigger was second and Hui Nalu third.

In the individual Hawaiian surfboard event, Jackie May of Honolulu won by eight lengths from Blue Russell of Australia. The race was over three-quarter mile. May's time was 5 minutes 53.9 seconds.

To Dick Chapple of Australia went third place. David Kalauokalani was fourth.

Nalu Makes Clean Sweep

Hui Nalu won four of five canoe paddling races from Outrigger. In the fifth race which was the Junior six event, they raced to a dead heat.

In the feature senior six event, the Hui Nalu crew, stroked by Fred Steere, won by a convincing margin.

After a nip and tuck race over three-quarter mile, the Healani six defeated the Japanese by one-quarter boat length in the senior barge rowing event.

The race was close all the way, with the lead changing hands several times. Healani took the lead at the halfway mark and matched the final sprint of the Japanese to cross the finish line first. Navy was third. The time was 4 minutes 42 seconds.

To Myrtle went the Junior race, with the Japanese copping the freshman event and Navy the novice compet. Myrtle also won the intermediate race.

Chabot, Kimura Win

Two outboard races were staged, with Russ Chabot winning the class B event and Charlie Kimura the class A competition. Both races were over six miles.

In the added feature, the half mile swim for men and women, Kiyoshi Nakama of Maui and Mary Ann Hawkins of Citywide won in their respective divisions.

Nakama took the lead away from Robin Biddulph at the three-quarter mark finished strong to win by at least forty yards. His time was 12:40.5. Peter Powlison was third and Hirose fourth followed by Pirie, Balmores, and Wolf in that order.

Miss Hawkins won by over a 100 yards from Mitsuko Higuchi of Maui. Fujiko Katsutani was third and C. Miyamoto fourth. Miss Hawkins proved to be too powerful a swimmer for her Maui opponents.
