

Civic Groups Aid Asked In Outrigger Club Drive

Emphasizing that the proposed Outrigger Canoe club expansion is a "community project," Walter Macfarlane, president of the club, met yesterday with the presidents or representatives of Honolulu civic organizations enlisting their help in the club's drive to sell \$90,000 in bonds for the new clubhouse.

Mr. Macfarlane stressed the fact that it is to be a woman's club as well as a man's, and detailed the various club facilities that will be offered the members, including the glass-enclosed lounge available for luncheon, teas, dinners or private parties, the bar, the gymnasium, and courts for different games.

"If the \$90,000 bond issue which the club is floating is not raised by Jan. 1," Financial Chairman Leslie Hicks said, "we'll have to call the whole thing off, and return all the pledges we've already received."

\$20,000 Raised

So far the club has just raised \$20,000 so "the bulk of our work lies ahead," he continued. Both he, President Macfarlane, and the chamber of commerce's president, Donald L. Ross, explained the value of the club to Islanders and told of their hopes for its success.

To date 145 new members have signed up, Mr. Hicks reported, so that the club is more optimistic about the membership. But everyone, he said, must help raise the bond issue.

"And we're soliciting the help of the organizations in putting over this venture," Mr. Hicks said, "for we're taking the club by the bootstraps and revitalizing the membership."
