"The tide was not always smooth, and it looked at times as though our club was going into a dive. But we learned to roll with the waves and to make the most of each small ripple of encouragement.

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"Those who stuck to the Outrigger club equally through thick and thin years knew they had a good thing. Volleyball courts were set up, a two story pavilion was constructed on the beach front, a dance hall and recreation court graced the upper floor of the locker building.

"Honolulu was back of the Outrigger Canoe club, for facilities and opportunities to use Waikiki beach were outstanding in the club," Mr. Center said.

A. H. Ford Helped Start Club Alexander Hume Ford was a dynamic personality in founding the Outrigger club.

He was a restless, roving newspaperman and magazine writer. Coming to the islands, he decided to stay, and began a career here that became almost legendary. It used to be said of him that he started at least one new club a week. The Outrigger was one of his favorites. He helped put it

through the infantile stages.

Today Mr. Ford, retired and not well, is living at the Fred Baldwin home, on Maui.

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Filling a large role in the developing drama of the Outrigger Canoe club, Mr. Center has tutored to worldwide fame such aquatic personalities as Duke Kahanamoku, Buster Crabbe, Pua and Warren Kealoha, Marieken Wescleau, Bill Harris and Helen Moses.
