first.




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Miss Duryea Wins

Helen Duryea took the women's surf riding event, and "Ox" Keaulani's six-man canoe outpulled all others in the canoe tug-of-war match. Fred Kingman's silver surfboard went to the winner.

Starting on shore at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel, Love got out in front of the rest of the paddlers through the heavy surf and led to the finish in the Leeds cham-pionship paddle. Sam Kahanamoku, last year's winner of the Leeds Trophy, came in second, ahead of George Young.

The decked sailing outriggers of Kahala held a winning advantage over the open Waikiki boats in the ten foot, smashing breakers over the reef. Malcolm Williams' entry knifed into the lead in the first ace and held it to the finish, with red Rice's Kahala number fol-lowing him in. The Walkiki craft, taking water with every wave, trailed home after nearly swamping in the first-break combers.

Love Is Consistent

In the men's surfing contest, the entries went from shore to a marker at sea, surfed in and rounded a buoy in the lagoon, and repeated the job twice more. Turkey Love's consistent ability to ride good waves, and his driving pace in getting back out through the pounding breakers, put him out in the lead early and brought him in first. Sam Kahanamoku's smart wave-catching gave him the margin over George Young for second spot. Walter Macfarlane donated the trophy for this.

Possibly the most spectacular work of the afternoon gave Blue Makua's four and six man canoes victory over the teams. With the highest surf of the year smashing into and over the craft the supeseamanship and power of Makua's outfits romped into first spot while other entries were swamping, submarining, and pearl diving.
