

Mrs. Julie J. Swanzy, Kamaaina, Dies At 80

many years in both the executive and economic phases of the 10 institutions under the association.

From 1909 until 1926 she was president of the Women's Auxiliary of the Outrigger Canoe Club, and was for many years chairman of the recreation commission of the city and county of Honolulu.

Restored Landmarks

Equally well known were her efforts to restore landmarks and relics of the kingdom of Hawaii, and to preserve the ancient customs of the Hawaiian people.

In her twelfth year as regent of the Daughters of Hawaii, in 1928, she presided at the dedication of the restored palace of Hulihee, the old stone residence built in 1837 by Governor John Adams Kuakini at Kailua, Kona, and occupied by King Kalakaua. Her name was also identified with countless other projects for the preservation of historic relics.

She was a generous and enthusiastic contributor to Queen Emma Home, to development of women's clubs both locally and internationally, to the encouragement of arts in Honolulu, and to many lines of welfare work and philanthropy.

Oldest of Family

As the oldest member of the Judd family in Hawaii, she had supervision of the centenary celebration by the family of the arrival of Dr. and Mrs. Gerrit P. Judd, who came with the third group of missionaries sent out by

the American board of commissioners for foreign missions and landed in Honolulu from the ship "Parthian" on March 31, 1828. This commemoration included a special service in Kawaiahao church exactly a century later, the unveiling of a bronze tablet in that church, a large family gathering at old Kualoa, and a reprint of Laura Fish Judd's book "Honolulu," originally published in 1880.

Mr. Swanzy died in 1917, after a long career as a leader of Theo. H. Davies & Co., Ltd., as president of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association, and as president of the Pacific Club.

Daughters Survive

Surviving Mrs. Swanzy are two daughters, Mrs. George Y. Bennett, of Waimanalo plantation; Mrs. Rosamond Swanzy Morgan of Honolulu, and three grandchildren, Francis, Juliet Patricia, and Richard Swanzy Morgan.

Funeral services in charge of Williams Mortuary, will be held at the graveside in Nuuanu cemetery tomorrow afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.
