Frankenstein To Testify In Bridges Trial

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11. (UP)—Richard Frankenstein, aviation division director of the United Auto Workers (CIO), stated today that he recognized that President Roosevelt ordered the army to take over the North American Aviation Co. plant at Inglewood, Cal., in the national interest.

Frankenstein issued the statement after he arrived here by plane from Los Angeles to appear as a surprise government witness in the deportation hearing against Harry Bridges, Australian-born California director of the CIO who is accused of Communist activity.

"There has been no abuse of power and no violation of individual rights," Frankenstein said, referring to the army's action at Inglewood, while waiting to testify. He said the strike ended today with the army still in charge of the plant.

Meanwhile, Bridges' attorneys presented two rebuttal witnesses in Claude Erwin and Louis Young.

Erwin said the IWW, to which Bridges had admitted belonging briefly, opposed sabotage and destruction of property. He said IWW pamphlets from which the gov-
