

# Tribute Is Paid To Memory Of 'Walter Mac'

As sunlight glinted through the open windows from the waters he loved so well, Walter James Macfarlane visited the Outrigger Canoe club for the last time Sunday morning—visited it in spirit.

"Walter Mac," 36, president of the organization, died of typhoid fever and pneumonia in Oakland, Cal., Friday.

On Sunday nearly 100, of those who knew and loved him gathered around the tables in the main salon of the clubhouse he helped to build, to pay tribute to his memory.

## Smile for Everyone

"This young man, who always had a smile for everyone, will never leave us," said the Rev. Henry P. Judd, who delivered the eulogy.

"Every bit of bamboo, every surfboard, every canoe and every person here will be living memorials of his sportsmanship and good fellowship."

"He can't be with us again physically, but he will always be with us in spirit," said Leslie A. Hicks, president of the Hawaiian Electric Co., and acting president of the club. "He loved Hawaii and would make any sacrifice for her. Those of us who knew him were greatly favored."

These sentiments seemed echoed as the soft strains of a Hawaiian melody, played by Elmer Lee's troupe, filled the room.

## Simple Decorations

Decorations were simple. At the head of the room, where the Rev. Mr. Judd spoke, was an American flag, a small shelf of white flowers and a bank of small green palms.

Close friends and associates of Mr. Macfarlane, and members of his family who could not return to the mainland to be with him at his bedside, sat in front of the speakers.

They included "Naka," the aged Japanese nurse who went to work for his mother, Senator Alice Kamo-kila Campbell, before Walter was born.

Others were Mr. Macfarlane's sister, Mrs. Kala Heck; his brother, Wyatt Macfarlane; his aunt, Mrs. Charles Amalu, and Mr. Amalu, and Sheriff Duke P. Kahanamoku.

Mr. Macfarlane's ashes will be brought back from California for interment. Funeral services were held in Oakland Saturday.
