myriad friends. He, together with a small band of enthusiastic and energetic young men, gathered together a small fund, secured the location and erected the first dwelling of the club. They were imbued with the idea to found a club at Waikiki dedicated to the perpetuation of the ancient sports of Hawaii, surf rid-

ing, canoeing and swimming.

The club prospered and grew in size and varied interests. Water sports were revived and a number of Olympic champions were de-veloped. Football and baseball teams were organized, volley ball came later and gradually the name Outrigger Canoe club became known outdoor sports wherever spoken of.

As time passed a peculiar lethargy set in and the club fell on lean days.

The depression of the early '30s almost succeeded in closing its doors, but under the energetic direction of its president with another group of "die hards, another club arose at its old site and was opened in 1941. Much of the credit for this achieve-ment is due to Walter J. Macfarlane, son of one of the charter members. It is fitting that at this time, when

the club has reached the highest peak of popularity and financial success that the old timers should gather to discuss the early days of the club and honor its founder, that grand old man "Pop" Ford.
