

Surfing, Paddling Races Kamehameha Day At Waikiki

The fifth annual Hawaii surfing and paddling championship to be held on Kamehameha Day, Sunday, June 11th will bring together once again the cream of Hawaii's own sport. The events this year will lack many of the former stars who are now in the armed forces although many mainland entries are anticipated.

Father Neptune will play an important part in the day's activities by the provision of suitable surfing conditions.

This year events are being sponsored by the Honolulu Junior Chamber of Commerce through the cooperation of the Waikiki merchants. Trophies, War Bonds and merchandize awards will be given to the first three place winners in each event. The outstanding attraction of the gala beach occasion will be a beach girl contest which will find the island's most beautiful girls vying for the cash awards and fame. Photographers and news-reel cameramen will be on hand to cover the events.

Surf Riding

The afternoon's program will include surfboard riding competition. Canoeing and Surfing Clubs that have been somewhat non-existent since the start of the war are now in training in anticipation of copping some of the very classy awards.

Duke Kahanamoku, by far the outstanding canoe steersman in the 1943 events, will be competing again in this year's championship in the six-men outrigger racing canoes.

The first surfing and paddling championship was held in 1939 under the auspices of the Hawaii Surfing Association, a sponsored organization of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. Due to war time conditions the surfing association has requested their sponsor, the Honolulu Junior Chamber of Commerce, to carry through with the surfing and paddling competition.

In 1939 the outstanding team was composed of Gordon Warner, Jack May, Al Spohler, and Gene T. Smith.

Smith, Spohler and May represented Hawaii in the Pacific Coast championship at Long Beach, California, in 1940. They

were the guests of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of that city.

All events will be visible from any section of the beach, free to all. Competition is open to anyone who is interested in competing.

The schedule of events which starts at 1 p.m. is listed below:

Surf board sprint open, wahi-ne canoe race, triangular surf board paddle, service men canoe race, beach girl contest, tandem surf board paddle, open surfing championship, men's open canoe race, tandem surfing championship.
