ing, at Waikiki. (4) To provide wholesome recreation at Waikiki beach and perhaps at other beaches, for considerable

numbers of young men and boys who now have no place to congregate except street corners, open public parks, and the beaches themselves.

Club and starts with the declaration that there will be no discrimination of any kind as to race, color or creed.

Members of this club tell The Star-Bulletin that surfing has been for several years on the decline at Waikiki. This is not only because of the

restrictions on the beach during

World war II—particularly in 1942

and 1943-but because there has been no adequate and permanent place where accommodations can be given for those who do not belong to the Outrigger Club or live in beach hotels with facilities for surfers.

The group which has been formed is preparing a petition to the mayor and members of the board of supervisors asking the city to provide accommodations for the storage of surf boards, lockers for surfers, and other facilities needed to maintain and expand the fine sport of surf

board and surf canoe riding.
