

Exciting Aquatic Program Is Planned By Outrigger Club

The Outrigger Canoe Club will hold its annual Kamehameha Day aquatic celebration Sunday afternoon at Waikiki beach, the first of 10 big events to start at 1 p.m.

On the program arranged by Duke P. Kahanamoku, world famous swimming marvel, and other members of the club's athletic committee, are swimming races, surfboard paddle races, canoe races and stunts. The program may be viewed by the public from the beach in front of the club.

Sunday's program is one of several staged by the club each year. The next big event is to be held on July 4, according to present plans.

Order of Races

Following is the program for Sunday:

(1) Kids six crew canoe race, starting from shore and proceeding to a flag buoy off canoe surf and return to shore.

(2) Free for all men's swimming race, starting from shore and proceeding to a flag buoy between canoe surf and the Royal Hawaiian Hotel and back to the starting point. Approximately 220 yards.

(3) Free for all swimming race for boys and girls under 16 years of age. Same course as No. 2 event.

(4) Junior six crew canoe race. Shore to flag buoy outside canoe surf, thence to flag buoy outside Queen's surf, thence back to flag buoy outside canoe surf and back to shore.

(5) Women's swimming race. Same course as No. 2 event.

(6) Mixed six man crew canoe race. Same course as No. 4 event.

(7) Tandem surfboard paddling race, men and women. Same course as No. 2 event.

(8) Women's six crew canoe race. Same course as No. 4 event.

(9) Surfboard open paddling race, length of boards not to be over 14 feet, solid or hollow. Same course as No. 1 event.

(10) Twelve man relay canoe

race, one canoe to each team. First lap must finish on shore with bow of canoe pointing toward ocean before next half of relay starts, teams not complying to be disqualified. Second half of race will finish with the bow of canoes pointing toward the shore in front of the clubhouse.
