

Supervisors 'Deplore' Race Discrimination

The board of supervisors, urging that Honolulu tradition of racial harmony and understanding be maintained and warning that situations creating misunderstanding and race prejudice are "contrary to the interests of this Territory," yesterday went on record as "deploring any action leading to racial intolerance and discrimination."

Board sentiment was embodied in a resolution which passed unanimously. The resolution was introduced by all seven supervisors: Chuck Mau, Manuel C. Pacheco, Noble K. Kauhane, Milton D. Beamer, Nicholas T. Teves, Herbert M. Richards, and Marshall F. Wright.

Prompted By Nakama Case
