

# Outrigger To Go All Out For A

## New Prexy Strong Advocate Of Sports

Eventual return to amateur athletic competition in swimming, track and other sports, including football, is planned by the Outrigger Canoe club, it was revealed by Wilford D. Godbold, newly elected president of the kamaaina beach organization.

A member of the Outrigger club since 1919, Godbold is serving his first term as its president but was a member of the board of directors for the past two years. In professional life he is chief deputy city and county attorney.

Revealing plans for the post-war years, the new prexy said one of the major objectives of the club is to revive swimming interest among the younger group and return to AAU competition. In the past the Outrigger developed some of Hawaii's outstanding natators who represented the United States in the Olympic Games.

In connection with the proposed athletic program, G. A. Harris, manager of the club, stated that David Kahanamoku is acting director of athletics and that an athletic committee would be appointed soon.

Godbold said that at the present time he is especially interested in getting the swimming program under way and is pointing for the club's annual Kamehameha Day canoe racing and surfboard paddling meet off Waikiki beach.

"Eventually, we hope to enter Outrigger teams in track and other sports, including football and basketball," he disclosed.

The new president also revealed that the Outrigger hopes to revive inter-island canoe racing, which was the Hawaiian sport of kings. Some years ago inter-island canoe racing was held annually at Kealahou Bay and was one of the year's big sporting events. He said sufficient canoes are available for this purpose.

The Outrigger also plans to step up inter-club social functions and activities which were curtailed during the war.

A member of the Kamaaina Beachcombers Hui as well as the Outrigger, Godbold has al-

ways been interested in aquatic sports. He is also an expert volleyball player and represented Outrigger and University of Hawaii teams in AAU tournaments in the early 1930s.

A graduate of Punahou Academy, where he ran the half mile on the track team, and the University of Hawaii, Godbold received his law degree at the University of Alabama, his home state. He was born in Camden, Ala., and came to Hawaii in 1919 and joined the Outrigger club as a junior member the same year.
