## Waikiki Water Cop Suggested To Direct Malihini Surf-riders

Waikiki may soon have its first water traffic cop if plans for the control of surfboard riders, canoeists and swimmers are approved by the board of harbor commissioners.

A survey of the situation at Waikiki is being made by a group of kamaaina surfing enthusiasts recreation director for the Outrigger Canoe Club, and pending the formal adoption of safety rules and regulations backed by the harbor board an effort will be made to have all surfers adhere to a common sense program designed for their own protection.
