

# Capacity Crowds Witness OCC Canoe Racing Program

Hundreds of holiday bathers and a capacity crowd of outrigger paddling enthusiasts along Waikiki's famed beach witnessed the Walter J. Macfarlane Memorial canoe races held yesterday by the Outrigger Canoe club.

Choppy waters offshore proved to be no obstacle to finely conditioned Hui Nalu paddlers as they tied the Outrigger crewmen for first place in a mild upset at the latter's home waters.

Hui Nalu and OCC were deadlocked at 23 points each, followed by Army with 14, Uluniu with 3, and the Junior Civic club with 1. Outrigger lost valuable points in being disqualified in the senior four paddle open and boys under 14 events.

Outrigger won the blue ribbon four mile senior six paddle event over Hui Nalu in the fine time of 22 minutes 7.3 seconds. The winning boat was named by Tommy Arnott, Carlos Rivas, J. Dowsett, Jim Pflueger, Jim Fernie and Allan Love.

The women's six paddle race over one and three quarter miles was won by an Outrigger crew which included two of Punahou academy's outstanding young mermaids, Pat Honl and Evanelle Mountcastle. The winning time was 8 minutes, 9.5 seconds.

A racing committee comprised of William J. Mullahey, Duke Kahanamoku, Robert Fischer and Neal Iverson, conducted the 10 event program in smooth fashion.

Prizes were awarded to all winning crews, with Outrigger gaining the Walter J. Macfarlane perpetual trophy for coming through with the title in the blue ribbon test.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 5. (AP)—Len Kasparovitch, the Salt Lake City Hawaiian who leads the Pioneer league pitchers with 13 wins and two defeats, was ordered today to report for a physical examination for induction into the armed forces.

The only league pitcher with a higher average, incidentally, is fellow Hawaiian, Bill Azevedo, who won the only game he hurled.

Independence day ended the first half of league play with the Bees in a tie with the Twin Falls Cow-boys for first place. Sale Lake City cropped its lone hold on top place in losing a doubleheader to Ogden yesterday 2-1, 12-2.

Bill Azevedo got one hit in the first game and two in the second but failed to score in either contest.

Behind Salt Lake City and Twin Falls have won 38 this season and lost 27. Behind them in order are Ogden, Pocatello, Idaho Falls and Boise.

## Wins England Tennis Title
