Letters have been sent to Frank acker, owner of the Consolidated Packer, Press of Sydney, Australia and publisher of the Daily Telegraph and the Sunday Telegraph. Packer, a noted sportsman and former ama-teur heavyweight boxing champion of Australia, originated the idea of sending the Australia surfmen to Hawaii

He personally financed the visit of the Australians to the islands and is interested in the coming visit of the Hawaii athletes to Australia. John Williams, who represents Packer here, is handling the corre-spondence between the local com-mittee, of which he is a member,
