"We four local fellows had seen and used the crawl stroke in Hawaii and at the time we raced the Army team, it wasn't known in the east as yet, and our opponents were very much surprised, for they hadn't lost a race in years. Each one of us received a trophy for winning.

Victor attended McKinley high school indulging is such sports as football, baseball, track, swimming, basketball. He also did a lot of bowling. Teams in the interscholastic league in those days were, Punahou, Kamehameha, St. Louis and McKinley.

Swimming and track, however, turned out to be Victor's favorite sports. In school he entered the high jump event, never taking first place, but always second to Hans Fassoth of Punahou. Vic also ran in the cross country races held locally for years. Jack Lee of Ka-
