

Thrilling Senior Race Hui Nalu Six First But Is Disqualified

Makes First Turn Around Wrong Flag; Thrilling Competition Staged On Beach At Waikiki; Hui Nalu No. 2 Crew Second

Disqualification of the Hui Nalu crew enabled the Outrigger Canoe Club six, steered by Duke Kahanamoku, to win the blue ribbon senior event yesterday in a Kamehameha Day canoe regatta which was staged on the beach as a warm-up for the July 4 races.

The two-mile race was a thriller all the way. The Outrigger crew set a fast pace at the outset as the paddlers raced a mile out to sea. Making the turn first, the OCC boat led Hui Nalu by a slight margin on the homeward beat. However, Hui Nalu outpaddled its rivals on the final turn and crossed the finish line about three lengths ahead.

Zale To Defend Ray Robinson May Get Shot At Champion Marcel Cerdan Also Looms As Opponent For Title Bout

NEWARK, N. J., June 11 (UP)—Tony Zale, an ancient but explosive ex-mariner, was slated today to defend in September the world middleweight championship he recaptured from Rocky Graziano last night in one of the ring's most glorious upsets.

Promoter Andy Niederreiter announced that he had Zale under contract to defend the title in September. Neither the site of the bout nor the opponent had been decided, he explained; but he believed either Marcel Cerdan, French middleweight, or Ray (Sugar) Robinson, welterweight champion, would be the challenger.

Co-managers Sam Pian and Art Winch said Tony was willing to defend in September. They emphasized, however, that Graziano would not be the opponent. "There's no need of fighting him again," Pian said. "Tony's already knocked him out in two of their three title fights."

NEW YORK, June 11 (UP)—Irving Cohen, manager of Rocky Graziano, announced today that the disposed middleweight champion definitely did not suffer any ill effects from his third round knockout by Tony Zale last night.

Cohen revealed that he called Dr. Benjamin Sherman of New York early this morning to Graziano's Brooklyn home to have him examine the fighter.

"I was called to give him the routine examination which is usual after all fights," Dr. Sherman said. "He was just upset about losing the fight, but otherwise his physical condition was fine."

"I found no evidences of any concussion or any head injury."
