

Hundreds Vie In Water Races

AT 11 A. M., a water parade with over 30 entries, including all of the yachts entered in the afternoon yacht races, sailed majestically up the Ala Moana channel as a prelude to a full afternoon of events.

The general races, viewed by an estimated 5,000 spectators lining Ala Moana beach, began at 1 p.m.

Waikiki Surf club walked off well in the lead for top honors, being entered in 8 of the 12 scheduled events and placing first in 6 of them and second in the remaining 2.

IN THE SURFBOARD races, all on a half-mile course, it was a clean sweep for the Waikiki Surf club, with its members tak-

ing every prize in each of the four races.

Junior surfboard race was won by George Downing Jr., Time: 6 minutes 45 seconds. Second and third place were won by Robert Krewson and "Dutch" Kino.

Womens surfboard was won by Jake Kalama, with Keanue Kekai and Elizabeth Paskowitz placing second and third.

In the senior surfboard, George Downing, Jr., "Rabbit" Kekai and Wallace Frosieth were one, two and three in that order.

ONE OF THE MOST thrilling races of the day proved to be the Tandem surfboard. William Tai and Anita Purg were clocked as winners in 5 minutes 54 3/5 seconds. Placing second and third were Robert Krewson and Nyna Olieveri; Herbert Bessa and Helen Hexton.

All winners of the surfboard races are members of the Waikiki Surf club.

BARGE RACES were run over the 3/4 mile course marked out in the Ala Moana channel, except for the women's event, which was rowed on the half-mile course.

UNIVERSITY of Hawaii crew and Healani Rowing club placed first and second, in that order, in both the novice and senior barge races. University crews, under Coach Francis Kuhane, were clocked in at 4 minutes 36 2/5 seconds for the novice event and 4 minutes 25.7 seconds for the senior.

Women's barge race was won by the Honolulu Girls Rowing club, time 5 minutes 26 1/5 seconds; with the Healani Girls Rowing club placing second.

Healani Rowing club, with a time of 4 minutes 33 4/5 seconds, took first place in the junior barge race. University of Hawaii junior crew was second.

Canoe races were held on the 3/4 mile track, except the women's event, which was run on the half-mile course.

Freshman race was won by the Hui Nalu, with the Waikiki Surf club placing second, and the Outrigger Canoe club third.

OUTRIGGER CANOE club won the Junior Canoe race in 5 minutes 40 4/5 seconds. Waikiki Surf club and Hui Nalu placed second and third.

Women's canoe event was taken by the Waikiki Surf club. Time: 4 minutes 7 seconds. Outrigger Canoe club placed second and Hui Nalu third in this event.

Most eagerly awaited and hotly contested event of the day was the final race, senior canoe race. Here again, the Waikiki Surf club walked off with the coveted first place medal, in the time of 5 minutes 22 1/5 seconds. Second prize went to Hui Nalu and third to the Outrigger Canoe club.

Harold Yap was chairman of the entire program of races. Judges were John M. Lind, Ler Kane, Ed Siler, Don Siler, John H. Stubler, James D. Evans and Charles T. Ayers. Official starters were Thomas Forbes, Jr., and Bob Fischer, with Pat Olds as timer and Betty Leamons as recorder.

As a preview of the water sports events, a torchfishing contest, sponsored by the Waikiki Surf club, and under the chairmanship of Robert Ohye, was held Saturday night on Ala Moana reef.

Winner with a total of 15 pounds of fish, squid and lobster, was the team of George Sakoda, C. Wakatake and R. Tanaka.
