The snack bar fountain formerly opposite the entrance into the building has been moved to one side. Instead of stools and bare legs, the view now will be of the ocean.

A new cocktail lounge has been provided at the end of the dining room on a floor which has been dropped three feet from the dining room level.

The dining room ceiling has been treated with sprayed asbestos to dampen the noise of glassware and silver.

FIGURED PLYWOOD WALLS

The walls are now of Canadian figured cedar plywood. The rooms of the clubhouse have been wired for sound, which can be provided either from the club itself or by

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music from Muzak.

An example of the ingenious use of new materials in a new way will be found at the beach patrol office where a screen of green, translucent plastic hinged at the top will serve as a sunshade by day and as a wall or gate when let down at night.
