

# Outrigger Crews Win Five Of Six Races

Outrigger Canoe Club paddlers captured five of six canoe races to dominate the annual Kamehameha Day canoe and surfboard regatta off Waikiki beach yesterday afternoon. Preventing a cleansweep for the sponsoring Outrigger Canoe Club, the Waikiki Surf Club won the men's novice race.

An overcast sky made it easy for some 5,000 spectators who lined the beach with most of the crowd concentrated in front of the Moana Hotel and the Outrigger Club.

All the men's canoe races were 1½ miles in length, the paddlers going off shore to a marker three-quarters of a mile out and paddling back shoreward.

Best time of the day was turned in by the Outrigger Club's "Leilani" crew in the open race. Winning by six lengths, the "Leilani" crew of Tommy O'Brien, Warren Ackerman, Jimmy Pflueger, T. Arnott, T. Ekstrand and steersman Turkey Love was timed in 10 min. 15.3 sec. A second Outrigger canoe beat out Hui Nalu for second place.

In the closest race of the program, the Outrigger freshman crew out-paddled Hui Nalu and Waikiki Surf in a virtual photo finish. The time was 11-min. 12.4 sec., with Hui Nalu just four-tenths of a second back.

The Outrigger junior crew of Neal Ryan, Jim Muirhead, Johnny Goss, Ella Long, Johnny Crites and steersman Jack Cross won by 10 lengths in 10 min. 16.3 sec., just one second off the senior crew's winning time. Outrigger Team B out-paddled Waikiki Surf for second place, the WSC canoe losing ground on a bad turn.

In the only women's race, over a straight course along the shore, Outrigger pulled fast in the closing stretch to nip Waikiki Surf and a second OCC canoe. The time was 1 min. 33.1 sec., with "Turkey" Love the steersman and Anita Berg pulling a strong stroke.

Waikiki Surf won the men's novice race in 11 min. 15.7 sec., with Hui Nalu a close second and Outrigger a floundering third.

Outrigger's winning crew in the race for 17-year-old boys pulled out of a near swamp after catching a wave and won in 11 min. 19.8 sec., with Paul Dolan the steersman. Hui Nalu finished second, with Waikiki Surf third.

George Downing of Waikiki Surf won the men's surfboard paddle event with plenty to spare. His time was 14 min. 28 sec. for the same course as the canoe races. Tom Schroeder of Outrigger was second.

The program opened with canoes bring gifts of food to the king, Sam Fuller. The winning

## Indians Beat Pirates, 8-4

PITTSBURGH, June 12 (UP)—Home runs by Larry Doby and Joe Gordon paced the Cleveland Indians to an 8 to 4 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates tonight to complete an Indian sweep of the two-game home-and-home exhibition series for the community fund.

The attendance was a disappointing 8,251, compared to last year's crowd here of 33,000. Cleveland won the first game this year at Cleveland, 6 to 5.

Both Doby's and Gordon's homers were hit off Jack Phillips, first baseman whom the Pirates are trying out as a pitcher. Doby's blast
