Triumphs In Surfboard, Canoe Races

7,000 People Attend Koolaupoko Lions' Kailua Program

It was a big day for the Waikiki Surf club at Kailua beach yesterday as the second annual Koolaupoko Lions club regatta turned the windward Oahu community into a mecca for visitors from all over the island.

Upwards of 7,000 people witnessed the day long activities at Kailua, thrilling to the outrigger canoe and surfboard paddling races, applauding the Hawaiian entertainment and enjoying the kaula booths provided by the Koolaupoko Lions club as their only means of raising funds to cover expenses of the colorful regatta.

The Waikiki Surf club won the team trophies in both the surfboard and canoe events. Paced by George Downing, the WSC scored 15 points to the Outrigger's 14 for the team trophy in the surfboard paddling meet.

In the canoe races, Waikiki Surf garnered 15 points, just two less than the combined totals of the other clubs. Hui Nalu was second with 14 while Outrigger and the debut-making Koolaupoko Lions tied for third with six apiece. Healani failed to tally a point but made a gallant try in its first year in outrigger canoe racing.

Waikiki Surf swept the women's events, the same five ladies pulling to victory in the senior and junior races. On the masculine side, the WSC won the blue ribbon event, the men's senior six, and the men's junior six.

Downing again played a major role in WSC's victory. He was steersman for the men's junior six and women's junior six and stroke on the men's senior six.

Hui Nalu started out the day by threatening a cleansweep, winning the first two races, the Kid's six and the freshman six. In events that didn't count towards the team standings, Waikiki Surf captured the special quarter mile for men over 40 and the quarter mile race for boys under 15.

The WSC men's junior six, steered by Downing, turned in the best time for a mile course, winning in 9:47.5. Second place Hui Nalu with 9:12 and third place Outrigger with 9:14 turned in better times than the winning boat in the senior six. WSC won by five lengths in the junior race.

WSC's winning time in the senior event was 9:20.1, with Hui Nalu second in 9:23.8 and Koolaupoko Lions third in 10:18.5.

Downing steered the WSC women's junior six crew of M. Kaanapu, Keane Kekai, Carnation Biven, Esther Kalama and Marmy Magoon to an easy victory over Koolaupoko and Outrigger. The time was 5:42.2 for a half mile course.

The same five girls, paddling in different positions and with Russ Takaki as steersman, won by two lengths in the senior race. The time was 5:23.8. Outrigger was second by a half length over a surprisingly strong Koolaupoko crew.

Hui Nalu won by a boat length in the kids' race in 5:02.5. The Hui Nalu freshman crew beat Waikiki Surf by just one-quarter boat length, in 5:03.4.

Duke Kahanamoku, marshal for the regatta, was steersman for the Outrigger 18 in the special race for men over 40. But Waikiki Surf, with Sam Steamboat the stroke and Kenny Tazaki as steersman, had too much pull. Hui Nalu took second and Koolaupoko Lions finished third.

Downing won the redwood plank (11-foot board) and half mile men's open events in the surfboard races. Pat Honi of OCC triumphed in the women's open and Tommy Schroeder gave OCC another first by winning the men's junior half mile event.

Before the races, a flotilla arrived on the beach with Queen Victoria Bright and her attendants and Duke Kahanamoku. Merrill K. Riley, Lions' district governor, gave the welcoming address. Pat Olds was chairman of the regatta committee.

Pep Protests Foe's Trunks

HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 3 (UP)—Lou Viscusi, manager of champion Willie Pep, announced today he would ask the New York boxing commission to establish a definite belt-line for Pep's featherweight title defense against Sandy Saddler at Yankee stadium Friday night.

Designation of such a line around Saddler's waistline would prevent Pep from being unjustly accused of hitting below the belt, Viscusi explained.

He charged that in their two previous fights, Saddler wore trunks with a four-inch hem above the waist. The height of that hem made some of Pep's legal punches appear foul, he said.
