

# Maritime Day Races Scheduled; Fireworks Held

Outrigger canoe races and public inspection of a submarine and a destroyer will top off Maritime Day observance in Honolulu tomorrow.

Several thousand persons drove out into intermittent rains last night to watch the Maritime Day fireworks from Ala Moana Park and heights parking areas.

Police estimated 5,000 went to Ala Moana Park and the heavy traffic there required extra officers. No accidents were reported.

The fireworks began at 8 p.m. and lasted an hour and 10 minutes.

## RACES TOMORROW

There will be no public observance of Maritime Day today, but tomorrow the public is invited to Pier 2 to visit the two naval vessels there and to watch the outrigger canoe races.

The submarine Sea Fox and the destroyer Philip will be open to the public from 9 to 12 a.m. and from 1 to 4 p.m.

The canoe races will begin at 1 p.m. A Navy band concert is scheduled for 2 to 3 p.m. with Hawaiian entertainment to follow until 4 p.m.

Honolulu's yachting fraternity will participate in the annual Maritime Day yacht races from Kewalo Basin to Pearl Harbor and return Saturday afternoon.

Presidency of the Port of Honolulu Propeller Club will change hands at a dinner dance tonight at the Queen's Surf. William R. Norwood, public relations director for Castle & Cooke, Ltd., will take over from Ernest C. Gray, of Hawaiian Dredging Co.
