

EXPECT MANY CLUBS TO COME INTO A. A. U.

More Than Required Number of Organizations Will Attend Today's Meeting.

There seems to be a growing interest in the proposed organization of a Hawaiian branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, and it is probable that many lines of sport will be represented at the meeting this afternoon, which is called for five o'clock in Lorrin Andrews' office, to get the local clubs into line. J. W. Harvey said yesterday that the Hawaiian Gun Club was likely to identify itself with the movement, and he promised to attend the executive session this afternoon. Ray Reftow announced that he would appear for the Myrtle Boat Club, and Bert Lightfoot will probably represent the Healanis.

Kenneth Brown is strong for having the Hawaii Yacht Club get into the amateur ranks, and he said, "You bet I'll be there," when it was suggested that the yacht clubs come in. There was some question about the hiring of men to do some of the work in connection with amateur crews in yacht races, and when it was explained to Rusty that the hiring of help would not affect the amateur standing of the yachtsmen, provided the navigator was not a professional, all obstacles were removed.

E. O. White was in favor of having the Oahu Country Club a party to the movement, and he said he would attend the meeting. Walter Dillingham, the president of the club, has gone to the Coast and several of the officers are out of town at this time, so it is not likely that the Oahu Country Club can take any official action in the matter before this meeting, but all those present can proceed subject to official sanction later, which can be obtained within a few days.

C. G. Bockus, president of the Hawaiian Tennis Association, won two straight sets yesterday in the E. O. Hall cup tournament, which keeps him in the game today. He may, however, be able to delegate some one else to represent the racqueters at the meeting. Harold Dillingham has been invited to represent the Oahu Polo Club, in the absence of his brother Walter. The Outrigger Club will send a representative. Alexander Hume Ford will appear for the Trail and Mountain Club. Corporal Woodruff will appear for the Military Athletic Association. The Oahu alumni baseball team will be represented by Winne. The Hawaiian Association Football will send a delegate to take H. J. Fiddes' place, who is absent from the Territory. R. A. Jordan will appear for the Honolulu Cricket Club. The College of Hawaii will probably send Leslie Clark. Professor Folsom may be the High School representative. St. Louis College is expected to send a representative. Stanley Livingston will appear for the Kamehameha Schools. The Boys' Club will be represented by E. S. Gault, the Y. M. C. A. by Paul Super, and Doctor Hand will be on hand with all his data gathered since President Peixotts of the Pacific Amateur Athletic Association first suggested to him that Hawaii come in. The Oahu College athletes will get together this morning to decide who will represent them at the meeting. All those who are not especially mentioned are expected to show up as well.
