

Waikiki Surf Club Wins Territorial Canoe Crown

KAILUA—Waikiki Surf Club of Honolulu, with a total of 35 points won the territorial Canoe Racing Championship Saturday in Kailua Bay. The event was named in honor of Frank Henriques of Kona.

The Outrigger Canoe Club of Honolulu placed second with 31 points and won the coveted men's senior six, two mile blue ribbon event. The time was 16:38.4. Healani was third with 25 points.

Heavy ground swells, which caused frequent delays as course flags broke adrift, marred the running of the day's events. A colorful crowd estimated at 2,000 was on hand. Otherwise, weather conditions were perfect.

Jack Greenwell was general chairman. Announcer was Curt Tyler Jr. Official boats included Capt. Henry Chee's Malia, Capt. Freddy McNamara's Mele Kai, and Capt. Rufus Spalding's Kealia III. Kona Amateur Radio Club maintained ship-to-shore communications.

Winners and first place times are as follows:

Event Number 1, boys' six, 13 and under, quarter mile—Kamehameha, of Hilo, first, Waikiki Surf, second, Kai Oni, third; Outrigger, fourth; winning time, 2:04.4.

Event Number 2, girls novice six, half mile—Healani, first; Outrigger, second; Kauai, third; Lani Kai, fourth; winning time, 4:43.6.

Event Number 3, boys novice six, half mile—Waikiki, first; Healani, second; Kauai, third; Holomua, fourth; winning time, 3:52.4.

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Event Number 4, boys' six, 15 years and under, half mile—Healani, first; Waikiki Surf, second, Holomua, third; Outrigger, fourth; winning time, 4:01.0.

Event Number 5, boys six 17 years and under, one mile—Waikiki Surf, first; Healani, second, Outrigger, third; Kai Oni, fourth; winning time, 8:14.6.

Event Number 6, freshman six, one mile—Healani, first; Kai Oni, second; Outrigger, third; Lani Kai, fourth; winning time, 8:20.7.

Event Number 7, blue ribbon senior six, two miles—Outrigger, first; Waikiki Surf, second; Kaioni, third; Huinalu, fourth; winning time, 16:38.4.

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Event Number 8, men's junior four, half mile—Waikiki Surf, first; Kaioni, second; Healani, third; Outrigger, fourth; winning time, 4:05.3.

Event Number 9, women's junior six, half mile—Outrigger, first; Waikiki Surf, second; Lanikai, third; Kai Oni, fourth; winning time, 4:22.2.

Event Number 10, men's senior four, one mile—Outrigger, first; Kaioni, second; Waikiki Surf, third; Hui Nalu, fourth; winning time, 8:34.6.

Event Number 11, Men's junior six, one mile and a half—Kaioni, first; Waikiki Surf, second; Healani, third; Outrigger, fourth; winning time, 12:29.0.

Event Number 12, women's senior six, half mile—Outrigger, first; Waikiki Surf, second; Kauai, third; Kai Opua, fourth, scoring its only point; winning time 4:46.4.

Points scored were first place, 5; second, 3; third, 2; fourth, 1. The races were run under auspices of Inter-Island Travel Service.

Reduced Bail Studied For Red Leaders

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — A 3-judge panel in the U. S. court of appeals took under consideration today the request of nine California Communist leaders that their bail, fixed at \$20,000 each, be reduced while they await possible re-trial on Smith Act convictions.

Norman Leonard appeared as attorney for the nine in brief arguments before Chief Judge Albert Lee Stephens, Judge William Healy and Judge Frederick G. Hanley. The government wasn't represented by counsel.

All of the nine are free on \$20,000 bail. Their attorney contended this bail was excessive and deprived them of due process of law.

He asked reductions as follows: William Schneiderman, Loretta S. Stack, Albert J. Lima, Oleta O'Connor-Yates, and Carl R. Lambert, \$10,000; Dorothy Healey, Ben Dobbs, Ernest O. Fox, and Frank Carlson, \$5,000.

The nine were among 14 Californians convicted in Los Angeles in 1952 on Smith Act charges. The U. S. supreme court on June 17 ordered five released outright and granted new trials to the others. If the government decides to prosecute again, the new trials must be set by September 16.
