# Molokai-Oahu Classic Great Endurance Test

One of the great endurance tests in sports, the Molokai-to-Oahu canoe race, will be held Sunday.

Nine crews clubs have been preparing crews in preparation for the 37½-mile pull from Kawakui Bay to Duke Kahanamoku Beach at the Hawaiian Village, Waikiki.

The leading canoes will be within sight of Oahu spectators at approximately 11 a.m.

Canoe crews usually pick one of two courses: from Ilo Point, Molokai, to Diamond Head or from Kawakui Bay to Koko Head.

Making the rugged crossing will be the Holomua from Kailua, Oahu; Kukui O Molokai O Lanikila; Kamehameha from Hilo; Kai Opua from Kailua-Kona; Kai Oni from Kailua, Oahu; Waikiki Surf Club and Hale Au Au from Waikiki and Healani and Hui Nalu from Ala Wai.

Since the canoes pass close to the reef, Oahu spectators can get a good view of race developments from Sandy Beach, Koko Head, Wailupe Peninsula, Black Point, Diamond Head lighthouse, Waikiki Beach and Fort DeRussy.

Thousands of automobiles can be parked at Fort DeRussy or the Ala Wai Yacht Basin near the finish line.

A luau will follow the race which is one of the high points of the annual Aloha Week festival.

Since each canoe will be allowed to switch tired crewmen as often as desired, a new rule, a record crossing can be expected. The record is held by Hui Nalu. The six hardy paddlers from this club covered the distance in six hours and five minutes in 1954.

The Outrigger Canoe Club is the defending champ and officials there are still undecided about being a last-minute entry.

## Rigney Vows New Lineup For 'Frisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 17 (AP)—Bill Rigney, retained as manager of the San Francisco Giants for two years, says Californians may see an almost entirely different club than the one that played at the Polo Grounds in New York.

The only two players sure to be in the lineup—"untouchables" Rigney calls them—are outfielder Willie Mays and southpaw Johnny Antonelli.

President Horace Stoneham signed Rigney, practically a local product, to a new contract yesterday. He said both he and the manager were satisfied with the terms, but he didn't say what they are.
