

Outrigger Club Liked Royal Site

Sheraton Corporation's failure to agree with Bishop Estate on the Royal Hawaiian Hotel grounds lease revealed today the Outrigger Canoe Club has

been dickering to move to the hotel property.

"The Sheraton people asked if we were interested in staying where we are," said Roland Q. Smith, canoe club president.

"We are interested in staying near where we are."

Until yesterday morning, said Smith, it appeared the club could make a deal to sub-lease part of the hotel grounds from Sheraton.

Then Sheraton-Bishop Estate negotiations broke down.
