

Kayak Racing Kickoff Set Tomorrow Morning

State Kayak program is slated for tomorrow morning at Ala Wai from 9 to 11, with the same times set for Sunday and all of next week.

John Bustard, Olympic Committee vice-chairman for canoe paddling, said that teen-agers as well as adults are invited to see demonstrations by Mikolos Tottosy, a former member of the Hungarian canoe paddling

Mikolos, a student at Stanford University, was brought here by the Hawaiian A.A.U., the Armed Forces, the Honolulu Athletic Coaches and Directors Association to teach Olympic canoeing techniques.

Bustard, who pointed out that the Hungarians were the top canoes in the last Olympics, said that the sponsors are desirous of hav-

ing school boys learn the fundamentals of canoe racing.

Adults who would like to coach are also invited to attend the course.

"Hawaii stands a good chance to take honors in the next Olympics as canoeing is a sport not very widely participated in on the Mainland.

"They are only six clubs in the East and none in the West Coast.

"There is no charge for Tottosy's course. All are welcomed. As school is out, this is a good chance for students to attend."
