

Isle junior men surfers head Makaha qualifiers

A field of 58 contestants was scheduled to compete in the men's junior division semifinals of the annual Hawaii International Surfing championships at Makaha this morning.

Waves were reported running at an average of five feet. Wally Froiseth, events chairman, said that if the waves got better the junior finals would be run off to-

day. If the waves don't improve the women's finals may be held.

In yesterday's action, 44 junior men qualified for the semifinals. They joined 14 others who were automatically seeded into the semifinals by winning a first place

in open surfing competition this year.

Top riders were locals Russell Lopera and Stanley Park, each of whom won 40 points out of a possible 60.

Other high scorers with 36 points were Kent Layton of the Windansea Surf Club

and Jock Sutherland of Honolulu's Hobie surfing team.

Jeff Hakman, the 17-year-old Punahou student who won the Duke Kahanamoku meet last week, was among those who gained a semifinal berth yesterday.

The competition, which ended at 1:30 p.m., completed the preliminaries for all events, including women's and senior men's events.

He will not sign until after the Gator Bowl game at Jacksonville, Florida, where Texas Tech plays Georgia Tech December 31.
