New Season Brings 3 New Ball Parks

No season is complete without the opening of a new ball park and this one has three—the new park of the Atlanta Braves, the one in St. Louis for the Cardinals and the Anaheim, California, Stadium which will house the California Angels.

The first to get going was the Atlanta Stadium, where the Braves played a few weeks ago.

The Braves will open their regular season Tuesday night against the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Atlanta Stadium has four lines of 325 feet to both left and right fields. Straightaway center is 404 feet. For baseball, the triple-tiered Atlanta park will seat 51,377 people, the third largest in the National League. Only the Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles and Shea Stadium in New York hold more. Four American League parks are larger.

The Atlanta Stadium can hold more people for football. The Falcons of the National Football League will play there. About 5,600 seats can be added to bring the seating capacity to 56,977.

If you are the type that walks around with a compass, the Atlanta Stadium diamond is oriented west-southwest by east-northeast. That won't change the flight of a home run.

There are no steel columns in the stands to obstruct the view of the fans. The total cost of the stadium was \$18,000,000, which
