

# Martha Sunn Wins Women's Surf Title

Martha Sunn, a tiny 15-year-old dare-devil who lives only a few blocks from Makaha Beach, defeated world champion Joyce Hoffman of California to win the women's division of the 15th annual Makaha International Surfing championships yesterday.

The diminutive member of the Sunn surfing family won a close, but unanimous decision over Miss Hoffman, generally considered the finest feminine surfer in the world. Miss Hoffman was the defending champion.

It was fortunate for Hawaii that Miss Sunn, a Waianae High School student, was entered, because

Californians took second, third and fourth place in the event.

In the Junior Men's competition, the crown went to pretournament favorite Reno Abellira, the defending champion representing the Kui-O-Hawaii Surf team.

A crowd of about 3,000 came out to watch the final day of surfing and it didn't get to see much in the way of spectacular displays of waves. The surf in the early morning was good, but by the time competition started the waves were flattening out and the average was only two to four feet.

"However, there were lots of waves and everybody got

lots of rides," said events director Wally Froiseth. "In the junior event, nearly, every one of the competitors got at least 30 rides in the hour and some as many as 33.

"As a result we had some tired boys by the time the competition had ended."

Yesterday's events wound up this year's competition. Earlier in the week, young Joey Cabell was crowned as the men's champion; and Bob Moore and Patti Young paired to win the acrobatic team championships.

The Duke Kahanamoku Sportsman Award went to Leroy Ah Choy for his overall department during the competition.

The Mayor Neal S. Blaisdell team championship trophy went to the Makaha Surfing Association which had one champion and one runner-up.
