

Sports Trio Honored

At Quarterback Luau

Diver Rachel Keala O'Sullivan, football player Mike Pavich, and the veteran Pump Searle were honored last night at the annual awards luau of the Honolulu Quarterback Club.

Searle received the Society Schuman award for his contributions over the years in athletics in Hawaii. Pavich, a football star at Kamehameha high school, was named the outstanding male athlete of the year and Miss O'Sullivan, a prime candi-

date for the U.S. Olympic diving team, the outstanding female athlete.

Awards were given in a dozen other categories at the luau held at the Outrigger Canoe Club.

Frank Valenti was the speaker of the evening and called for a "clearing out of the dead wood" in our sports programs.
