SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Warren Woodson, one of college football's top offensive coaches, will become athletic director of Trinity University in June.

Woodson, football coach and athletic director of New Mexico State, is retiring under the mandatory age rule at that university June 1.

He will succeed Bob Polk at Trinity. Polk resigned last month as athletic director to devote full time to coaching basketball.

The 65-year-old Woodson is a Baylor University graduate. He coached at San Marcos Baptist Academy, Texarkana Junior College, Arkansas State College of Conway, Hardin-Simmons, Arizona and New Mexico State. He developed the wing T foot
